A Message from the Department Treasurer

Brothers and Sisters,

Happy New Year! I hope each of you had a wonderful Holiday season.

There are several reminders for you as we begin the New Year.

- *First, and obviously very important. All applications must be submitted on the new application form effective 1 January. Any application I receive after 1 January on the previous application form will be returned to the Auxiliary. I will not mail the application but email the treasurer and President of the need for a new application to be submitted. There have been many reminders of this change and there will be no exceptions made.*
- *Any application missing any of the required information, or with incorrect information, will be returned. This includes the sex of the applicant being marked. Pay close attention to the **relationship of the applicant To the veteran**, NOT the Veteran's relationship to the applicant. This is a very common mistake, National will reject an application if this is missing, and from this point on, so will I. I will no longer make any changes or corrections to applications. As I have said before, I am not supposed to make any marks on the application as these are legal documents once they have been signed by the applicant. So, it is very important the investigation committee thoroughly review every application to ensure it is completed properly. And the treasurer to review of one last time before sending the application for processing.*
- *Please remind any applicant wanting to pay by credit card to be sure to respond to the message sent by National to enter their payment information. If the information is not received within 30 days, the application becomes null and void, requiring a new application to be completed, voted on and submitted.*
- *It is the responsibility of the **APPLICANT** to provide their proof of eligibility to join the Auxiliary. Not the responsibility of the Auxiliary. If the applicant does not provide their proof of eligibility, with the proper documentation, they must find it. A veteran who is deceased is no longer affiliated with the VFW. Therefore, the applicant is joining as unaffiliated. A veteran who is a member of another Post other than the one the applicant is joining is not Post affiliated. The applicant must join as unaffiliated and show proof of the veteran's eligibility.*

*Your 31 December audits are due to me no later than 28 February. This gives two months for the trustees to meet, conduct the audit and present it to the members for approval before sending it to me. Section 814-A.4 (pg.87) States. "The Auxiliary must vote to accept the audit and **THEN** forward a copy of the accepted audit to the Department Treasurer." The date of the **REGULAR** meeting this is done **MUST** be included on the copy of the audit sent to me. If this date is not provided, it delays the audit being accepted, as I must contact the treasurer to get this information. Please remember to include this information on the form.*

PLEASE MAKE SURE ALL OF YOUR CONTACT INFORMATION IS CORRECT IN MALTA. IF YOU CHANGE YOUR EMAIL, PHONE NUMBER OR ANYTHING, PLEASE UPDATE YOUR INFORMATION. WE NEED TO BE ABLE TO CONTACT YOU.

JANUARY NOTES

I hope everyone had an enjoyable holiday. It sure is hard for me to believe that we are heading into the last half of this program year. I know it has been an unusual time for our Department with the passing of Anna Holm. As you know, Anna was elected President of our Department in June of 2025. Due to poor health, Anna resigned her position in September, and passed in October. There have been some questions as to why we do not refer to Anna as a Past Department President. Although we respect Anna's many years as an active member of our Department, the National Bylaws stipulate that a Past Officer shall be someone who, having been elected or appointed and installed, ceases to hold office by completion of their term, or by death before the expiration of their term of office. (see Section 808). Unfortunately, Anna's resignation in September precludes her from being referred to as a Past Department President. It does not diminish the value of her years of service, nor our respect for her dedication.

In accordance with the National Bylaws, Section 809A, Lin Moore who was elected as Senior Vice-President, and Tracy Armstrong who was elected as Junior Vice-President, succeeded to the offices of President and Senior Vice-President, respectively. Farres Upton was appointed Junior Vice-President Pro Tem. The Council of Administration will vote to fill the office of Junior Vice-President for the remainder of this term at the upcoming Council of Administration meeting on February 8, 2026. Farres has indicated her candidacy for this position, and agrees that if elected by the Council of Administration will not pursue the typical order of progression through the chairs, but will only serve until the election of officers at the June Convention. If you have questions or concerns about this process, please feel free to contact me or any of the current line officers.

The new applications will indicate a 2026 revision date. The old applications will not be accepted, so please be sure you are using the correct application.



This month I want to talk about the PARC unit located on the 9th floor of the VA. This floor is for patients with mental conditions and need a little extra attention and care. As the Department Special Project this year focuses on Mental health, these patients get very few donations and visitors.

A small group of only 2 or 3 people can schedule to spend an hour or hour and half to play bingo with the patients. Bring small snacks and prizes. Jessica Cornett, the volunteer coordinator, is available on certain Saturdays, and during the week.

The patients also love coffee, donuts, ice cream sandwiches, cookies, etc. It is best to send her gift cards to places like Dunkin Donuts, Krispy Kreme or even Food Lion. Then she can purchase the items for the patients, and they can have a little party. There are currently 28 beds in this unit with patients ranging in age from freshly discharged to their 80's. And occasionally they do get female veterans admitted.

Don't forget about the Sweats for vets program and operation Cold front (the need for NEW warm coats) as we continue into the coldest time of year.

Legislative News and Updates

A message from our 2025-2026 VFW Auxiliary Legislative Ambassador, Amy Jo Lett!

The Senate Committee on Veterans' Affairs held a hearing on December 13th to examine VA medication management for which the VFW submitted testimony. They went on record to convey to Congress how serious this problem has become. Two House bills have been introduced that would provide real protection. **H.R.4837, Written Informed Consent Act**, would require written informed consent before VA prescribes certain psychiatric medications; and **H.R.2623, Innovative Therapies Centers of Excellence Act of 2025**, would expand access to innovative PTSD treatments to reduce reliance on heavy medication. **SUPPORT!**

Congress: Congress recessed on December 19th. Lawmakers won't be back until after Jan. 5. We may be facing another **Government Shutdown** as Congress is facing another funding deadline at the end of January! We must continue to keep up the pressure to get funding done and to act on Veteran bills and Issues!

Contact Congress to urge them to pass **H.R. 2605/S. 1441, the Service Dogs Assisting Veterans (SAVES) Act!** This legislation proposes a five-year pilot program for the VA to award grants to nonprofit organizations to provide trained service dogs to eligible veterans, cover the cost of training, and provide lifelong veterinary insurance.

Congress passes the National Defense Department Appropriation Act! On December 17th, the US Senate passed the National Defense Authorization Act (NDAA) for fiscal year 2026, sending the Pentagon's annual policy bill to President Donald Trump's desk. The bill—running to more than three thousand pages and authorizing more than \$900 billion in spending—covers all corners of the defense policy landscape. For a detailed dissection read:

Bills passed by the House and go the Senate next: None

Bills passed by the Senate and go to the House next:

H.R. 607 Improving Veteran Access to Care Act--A bill to require the Secretary of Veterans Affairs to establish and implement a plan to improve the process for scheduling appointments for health care from the Department of Veterans Affairs, and for other purposes.

S. 610 Ensuring VetSuccess On Campus Act of 2025--This bill requires the Department of Veterans Affairs to ensure that the VetSuccess on Campus (VSOC) program is located in every state. The program supports veterans, servicemembers, and qualified dependents who are transitioning from military service to college life. The VA must ensure that at least one VSOC counselor is located in each state.

S.787 VetPAC Act of 2025--A bill to amend title 38, United States Code, to establish a commission to review operations at the Veterans Health Administration and submit to Congress reports with respect to that review, and for other programs.

S.1204 Gold Star and Surviving Spouse Career Services Act--A bill to amend title 38, United States Code, to make certain spouses eligible for services under the disabled veterans' outreach program, and for other purposes.

S.1383 Veterans Accessibility Advisory Committee Act of 2025--A bill to establish the Veterans Advisory Committee on Equal Access, and for other purposes.

S.2393 Fiscal Year 2025 Veterans Affairs Major Medical Facility Authorization Act--A bill to authorize a major medical facility project for the Department of Veterans Affairs for fiscal year 2026 in St. Louis, Missouri, and for other purposes.

S.3436 Caring for Veterans and Strengthening National Security Act--A bill to amend title 38, United States Code, to require the provision of certain services to veterans in the Freely Associated States, and for other purposes.

Bills passed by Congress and go to the President next:

H.R.1823 VA Budget Shortfall Accountability Act--To direct the Secretary of Veterans Affairs and the Comptroller General of the United States to report on certain funding shortfalls in the Department of Veterans Affairs.

H.R. 4446 FAST VETS Act--To amend title 38, United States Code, to modify the conditions under which the Secretary of Veterans Affairs is required to redevelop the individualized vocational rehabilitation plan for a veteran, and for other purposes.

Leaders of the VFW and American Legion praise Trump's Executive Order Reclassifying Cannabis!

Reclassification will allow the FDA to conduct research into its therapeutic value for veterans. December 18th, President Donald Trump issued an executive order to reclassify cannabis in a way that will allow FDA to legally conduct research into its therapeutic value for veterans. This is an important executive order. Cannabis being classified schedule 1 blocks large-scale, randomized clinical trials examining cannabis' impact on PTSD, TBI, sleep disruption, anxiety, depression, and chronic pain ... conditions strongly associated with veteran suicide. Reclassification is not legalization and does not mandate use of Cannabis for non-medical use, but rather promotes transparency, clinician oversight, informed consent, and honest patient-provider discussions – reducing unsafe self-medication. *This article's original publication can be found [here](#).*

Remember!! Report your Election activities in MALTA! That includes voting, working the polls, working as a greeter, attending Candidate Forums and Candidate events.



Patriotism Through Literacy

Patriotism Through Literacy is a VFW Auxiliary **Youth Activities** initiative started in 2019, the purpose of which is to foster a love of reading while teaching students about America's past primarily through historical fiction and creative non-fiction, promoting both patriotism *and* literacy, in addition to encouraging empathy and broadening perspectives. The intended age range of readers/listeners of the books below spans from pre-k through grade 12.

In the world of children's literature, there is often talk of "mirrors and windows." In books labeled "mirrors," kid readers get to see themselves reflected in the main characters. In "windows," they see into the lives of characters they'd otherwise never know. That is why the books on our list of Recommended Reads not only showcase a number of periods in history from the Revolutionary War through post-9/11, they reflect a variety of character viewpoints: girls, boys, children, teens, adults, veterans, the children of veterans, etc., of all different backgrounds, cultures, colors, ethnicities, religions, American regions/states and abilities/disabilities.

The Recommended Reads are divided into **Historical Fiction** (fiction taking place in the past, set in the United States), **Americana and/or Educational** (fiction, non- or a mix of both, these books are about America's holidays, history, geography, government, parental deployment, etc., primarily for younger readers/listeners who may not be ready for more complex books yet, with additional titles for young children with a deployed or recently returned veteran parent), and **Creative Non-Fiction, Biography & Memoir** (biographies of important figures in American history, historical accounts from real people/events learned through interviews, letters, or diary entries, and memoirs of childhood that paint a distinct picture of America in the past). The list is periodically updated to include newly published works. While some classics appear among our Recommended Reads, most of these titles or series were published in the past 25 years, with many published within the last decade.

Note: The grade/age levels into which these are divided are suggestions (not rules) based on publishers' guidelines, school curriculums, reading/comprehension levels and story content.

SYMBOLS KEY:

*Indicates it has a character who is, or whose parent, grandparent, sibling etc. is, a veteran, deployed, about to be deployed, returning from deployment, MIA, or was Killed in Action.

^A Indicates that the book was not written for Young Adult readers; it is an adult book with crossover appeal that **mature teen readers** may enjoy/comprehend (discretion advised).

Underlining indicates that the author or co-author of the book is a veteran.

Ellipses... indicates that part of the book's title was redacted because it was too long, so please Google/search for the full title or ask a librarian or bookseller for the full title.



