



The Veteran and Family Support Program is a program designed to provide educational topics to assist the Auxiliaries in providing assistance and support to veterans and their families. We offered various topics including mental health support, suicide prevention, and awareness programs. The program is aimed to assist the Auxiliaries with valuable information in providing support to veterans who may be struggling with various veteran associated issues like mental health issues, financial and food instabilities and support to their families who may also be impacted.

Monthly topics for this program year included caregiver support, veteran suicide, food banks, and USO (United Service Organizations) support. These topics are chosen to address the specific needs and challenges faced by veterans and their families. The program provides resources and support to help address these issues and improve the overall well-being of veterans and their families.

One of the key topics of focus for the Veteran and family Support program this year is suicide prevention. The program provides resources and support to help prevent suicide among veterans, including education and training programs. It also offers mental health services to veterans who may be at risk of suicide.

In addition to suicide prevention, the monthly program topics also focuses on raising awareness about mental health issues and the importance of seeking help. This is an important part of our programs as the goal is to inform and teach others the importance of respecting our flag, our veterans, POW/MIA's and Veterans and Flag Holidays.

National VFW Auxiliary Ambassador and Patriotic Instructor Diana Russle-Milton has asked the following questions, "Why are you proud to be an American and how do we show our pride in America."

I ask that all auxiliaries for North Carolina take part or report on each of the different parts of Americanism. Reporting is now open and with the new year starting lets make North Carolina stand out and show how proud we are of our Veterans and how we teach others to celebrate them and our country.

Program Reporting

Flag Education (Promote Patriotism)- Organizing with youth groups or schools to teach our youth the importance of the flag. The origins of today's VFW National Home can be traced to a 23-year-old woman named Amy Ross.

In 1922, Ross made it her mission to help find jobs for the thousands of unemployed veterans in Detroit.

THE BEGINNING

News of Ross' efforts reached cattleman Corey Spencer, who gifted 472 acres of land near Eaton Rapids, Michigan, to build on Ross' vision of supporting veterans.

On Jan. 7, 1925, the VFW National Home was founded, helping to fulfill the VFW pledge to "honor the dead by helping the living." Later that spring, the Home welcomed its first family in an old frame farmhouse, Mrs. Pollett and her six children. Pollett had become suddenly widowed and lost her husband's military pension.

It's time to inspire our members and communities by telling our story through media. The Department of North Carolina has over 70 Auxiliaries united by the call to serve veterans and their families and promote patriotism in our communities. Whether your Auxiliary is large or small, you can use media to share your story and record its history.

Media

Media allows us an opportunity to share and brag about what Auxiliaries at all levels (local and District) are doing for our veterans, their families, and our communities. Many of our seasoned members utilize Facebook while many of our younger members prefer Instagram. So, what is stopping your Auxiliary from utilizing those two social media platforms? Did you know that those two platforms can "talk" to one another, and you can cross-post to both platforms by linking your two profiles together? There are other media outlets that can be utilized as well.

- Reach out to your members and friends using social media. Create an Auxiliary Facebook page, Instagram, Twitter, YouTube, or Pinterest.
- Use video! Videos are a great way to communicate; they are more visually engaging than written content and a great way to deliver information.
- Many of us have smartphones and it's easy to record, upload and share videos on social media.

Reels

This year, National is focusing on Auxiliaries using and creating Reels to spread the word about our Programs and what you're doing in your communities. I know you are asking yourself, "What the heck is a Reel?'

 Reels are full-screen vertical videos up to 90 seconds long. They feature a suite of editing tools and audio tracks, as well as trending voice/sound snippets. Reels allow you to add captions, stickers and backgrounds;

- upload video clips; use a range of filters and loads more.
- Reels can be made up of a single video, several clips edited together, still photos or some combination of photos and video. Reels can be posted to both Instagram and (which has 1.3 billion users!) and Facebook. Reels have outstanding visibility and usually appear at the top of your feed.
- Descriptions and hashtags should be used for the Reels as well and those are easy to add.
- Visit MALTA Members Resources, Historian & Media Relations, to read about how to create a reel.

Please continue to use traditional methods of communication to get information out. Email, monthly or quarterly newsletters, flyers, newspapers and magazines are time-tested ways to share Auxiliary news and events. You should recognize your members who are celebrating birthdays, anniversaries, volunteer work, etc. Remember to include the 5 W's (who, what, when, where and why) when recording a video, writing a post for social media or an article for a newsletter. Details matter!

Department President's Official Visit

The Auxiliaries will be capturing photos and videos of the Department President's visit as well as events that take place in the Auxiliaries throughout the year. I am requesting that each Auxiliary Historian submit a minimum of five (5) photos of the Department President during her visit to your District. Also submit photos of events, fundraisers, meetings and ceremonies that take place in your District. This is your opportunity to brag about your District/Auxiliary to the Department President. I recommend that you post your story to the Department Historian Facebook page or send your photos to Historian & Media Relations Chairman Barbara Beard, 198 Oakridge Dr, Raeford, NC 28376. Make sure it's something you are proud of!

Welcome to another program year. The Hospital program is one of the oldest Programs in the VFW Auxiliary, starting in 1914. There is so much we can do through this program to support our Veterans. Fund raising, donations, visits, activities, volunteering. The ways can be endless.

Our biggest goal is to recruit volunteers. The more volunteers we have, the more we can do for our veterans. Volunteers can be anyone. Members, non-members, youth, family members. The hospital program has been expanded to include facilities that are not only VA hospitals, but local hospitals, veterans' homes, nursing homes (both VA and non-VA), and clinics. Each of these facilities always appreciate volunteers assisting in many ways and areas. The opportunities are based on the facility you are volunteering at. You do need to be sure to contact the facility to check on the requirements for the volunteers there.

VFW Auxiliary members may participate in activities voted on by the members of your Auxiliary. This can include monthly or quarterly bingo with the patients. Snack bags taken to the facilities. Members can make items such as lap robes, hats, quilts, etc. You can make Valentine cards to place on the meal trays for the Veterans. For each holiday, the VA facilities in North Carolina hold specific activities to assist the Veterans in need in the Community.

The VAVS (Veterans Affairs Voluntary Service) program was created to serve in VA Medical facilities in partnership with Veteran Service Organizations. Each of the 4 VA Facilities in North Carolina have designated Representatives to communicate with the members the needs of each hospital They are your direct connection to the VA hospital your Auxiliary is assigned to.

Lighting the way between veterans' families and legislators with a wave of gratitude.

Thank You for Your Service—Turning our Gratitude into Action

Every time we say, "Thank you for your service," we are acknowledging the sacrifices made by veterans and their families. But we can go beyond words and translate gratitude into action. Our Legislative Program empowers us to advocate for policies that improve the lives of veterans, service members and their families by tuning our appreciation into meaningful legislative advocacy. Your efforts, combined with the nearly 1.5 million other VFW and Auxiliary members, can influence lawmakers whose decisions affect veterans and their families every day. Join the chorus of voices that will ring out in legislator's offices this year!

We will learn to "Follow up with Gratitude." After in-person meetings with local legislators, follow up with an email or thank-you card. Establish Legislative "Gratitude Days" of action to send legislators a message of thanks

Establish specific days of action where Auxiliaries commit to contacting legislators with a message of thanks, while also urging them to support legislation that benefits veterans, and more!

Study the issues laid out clearly in the VFW Priority Goals. The VFW focuses on these to strengthen and ensure an adequate VA system for millions of current and future veterans. The goals are grouped by six areas of concern: Budget; Health Care; Disability Assistance and Memorial Affairs; Education, Employment and Transition Assistance; Military Readiness; National Security; Foreign Affairs and POW/MIA.

These goals are released in January of each year by the VFW on the VFW National website: https://www.vfw.org/-/media/vfwsite/files/advocacy/prioritygoalsbrochure.

VFW Action Corps Weekly: These goals are released in January of each year by the VFW on the VFW National website at: https://votervoice.net/VFW/register. To identify your congressional representatives, visit the VFW website at: https://votervoice.net/VFW/Address. Please **keep track of all the new sign-ups**, you will need to report that total for the year.

Step by step—A Bill: To follow the progress of a specific bill through the stage of the legislative process by its number or by a key word or phrase go to: https://www.congress.gov/.

Advocates in Action: We need to "Speak the language" and navigate the legislative process effectively. Be familiar with the Priority Goals and the VFW Key Bills in Congress. Sign-up for Action Corp Weekly AND respond to them! Communicate with your legislators and elected officials (via phone, email and personal visits). Be brief and to the point. Stick to one issue per phone call or email.

Appoint a Legislative Chairman for your Auxiliary that will stay on top of the issues. Get involved with Town Hall meetings.

Be sure to **VOTE** in **ALL** elections and assist others in doing so. Use MALTA Member Resources under Legislative and teach others to. <u>DO NOT</u> endorse any candidate on behalf of the VFW or VFWA—remain neutral. <u>DO NOT</u> wear any VFWA attire when campaigning for a candidate. Many of you will have

Municipal Elections coming up in the fall. With the 2026 Mid-Term Elections coming soon, your Representatives will be campaigning in your districts. Find them! Attend events and talk to them.

Legislative Program Awards for Auxiliaries

Most outstanding activity and/or event to create thank-you notes and cards to veterans that include links to VFW Action Corps Weekly and/or the VFW Priority Goals. Hi to all Auxiliaries and Districts, I am your new scholarship chairman for this year 2025-2026. The scholarship program is divided into two parts, the VFW National Scholarship Programs and the Auxiliary National Scholarship Programs. Each of these scholarships encourage patriotism, assist students in attaining an education and help students reach their full potential.

VFW NATIONAL SCHOLARSHIP PROGRAMS (For these two programs the Auxiliaries should try to work together with their Post members to promote the programs).

<u>PATRIOT'S PEN:</u> A youth essay contest open to students in grades 6-8 who are enrolled in public, private, parochial school or home school programs. The grand prize is \$5,000.

<u>VOICE OF DEMOCRACY</u>: An audio-essay program for students in grades 9-12 who are enrolled in public, private, parochial school or home school programs. The grand prize is a \$35,000 scholarship.

Both the Patriot's Pen and Voice of Democracy themes are "HOW ARE YOU SHOWING PATRIOTISM AND SUPPORT FOR OUR COUNTRY?", the student entry deadline for both programs are due to Posts by October 31, 2025. You can find information; instructions and can download application forms for the Patriot's Pen and Voice of Democracy online at www.vfw.org under the community tab.

AUXILIARY NATIONAL SCHOLARSHIP PROGRAMS

CONTINUING EDUCATION SCHOLARSHIP: Open to any Auxiliary member (a member for at least one year), their spouses and children. This is the only scholarship limited by membership. The scholarship is \$1,250 awarded to one winner in each of the four conferences. Zoom Etiquette

Have you ever attended a video conference and watched what other people are doing in their video? Some of it is distracting, some of it downright distasteful, and some of it just plain annoying. Below are some guidelines to follow when attending a Zoom meeting.

- Maintain eye contact Participants should remain focused in the camera's direction, avoiding shifts in attention (looking out the window, typing on your computer, multitasking, etc.) It is especially important to maintain eye contact by looking at the camera when speaking. Hosts should consider the camera as another person and look at it during their discussions.
- Mute the microphone The microphone may be muted when you sign in. If not, setting
 your audio to mute eliminates all annoying and unexpected background noises in your
 environment. The host has the option to mute everyone's microphone and then unmute
 them when the time for questions arises.
- Position the camera & use proper lighting Participants do not want to see the top of your head (camera facing down on you) or up your nostrils (camera facing up). Instead, the camera should be at eye level. Your room should be well-lit with no bright light directly behind you or in the camera's view. Make your face visible by having a strong light behind the camera, but try to avoid light reflections in eyeglasses. To accommodate small screens, your camera and seating position should be adjusted to fill the frame as much as possible.
- Use your normal voice Speak strongly and clearly. Because there might be a one second audio delay for some conferencing, use a brief pause between speakers to assure the full audio signal has been transmitted. When many people are speaking at once, it is difficult for participants to discern both the conversation and the person speaking. Repeat questions or comments to be sure that all participants heard them.
- Allow time for others to answer or to make comments Often participants will wait to see if the host has a comment or answer to the question before they will respond. When questioning a participant, identify them by name first, and then ask the question so they have a chance to unmute and respond.
- Avoid interrupting
- Raise your hand to speak or better yet, use a nametag to get the host's attention.
- Limit distracting side conversations
- Be aware of the microphone placement The microphone can magnify sounds that normally occur during meetings. Don't rustle papers or tap on the microphone or table.
- **Keep body movements to a minimum** Avoid distracting movements like swaying, rocking, or pacing. Move and make gestures naturally a safe distance from the camera.
- Restore eye contact after an audio-visual presentation After a slide presentation or screen/document sharing, restore eye contact with the participants.
- **Sharing on-the-fly writing** Zoom has a built-in whiteboard, but be sure you are very familiar with it before attempting to use it.
- Family issues Inform the family that you will be on a video call to reduce interruptions or distracting sounds (spouse or children shouting, dog barking, baby crying, etc.)
- **Using the Chat room** Keep all chats short and on topic. Do not ask about lunch, drinks after work, or "did you hear..." It's very difficult for the host monitoring the chat room to weed out real questions through a maze of small talk.

- Leave the keyboard alone No one wants to hear the clicking of your keys on the keyboard. The only acceptable reason to use the keyboard is to type questions or responses in the chat room.
- No personal grooming Be careful of what you do in front of the camera. Participants
 don't want to watch you comb your hair, pick your nose, clean your teeth, etc. Turn off
 your video and microphone if you need to do anything at all personal or distracting.
- No eating Unless the meeting is about sharing food, no one wants to watch you eating.
 It is distracting and unprofessional, not to mention crumbs will fall into your keyboard.
- **Dress appropriately** You should wear something similar to what you would wear to an in-person meeting. If you choose to not have appropriate clothing on from the waist down, DO NOT get up in the middle of the meeting with your camera running.
- **Stay inside** Wind and background noise makes your device's microphone adjust and your voice may sound muffled.
- Choose an appropriate environment Make sure it is uncluttered (no unmade beds), appropriate (no bathrooms), and where you are less likely to be interrupted. If your device can handle the processing requirements, use a virtual background but keep it simple.
- If you must step away Turn off your video and microphone.
- **Leaving a meeting** Always sign off with a formal goodbye so people know you aren't coming back.
